

A VIGIL AT HOME

When waiting is all we can do...

Waiting is all we can do –
and it is the hardest thing we can do.
Our hearts ache with the pain of separation;
our hands long to hold –
our eyes long to see –
and our ears long to hear the voice of the one whom we love.
Our heads know the logic of the separation –
but our hearts tell a different story:
of fear – yearning – and, sometimes, despair.

Into this waiting, we invite God – who waits with us.

Into this waiting, we invite Mary, the Mother – Mary Magdalene – and John who waited at the foot of the cross. They witnessed the suffering of the One whom they loved – and were utterly helpless to ease the suffering which resonated in their own souls.

Into this waiting, we invite Jesus and Mary, the wife – who waited alongside Joseph as he approached the end of his life.

Jesus, not feeling the need to heal or restore Joseph to life – but waiting as he commended the spirit of his beloved foster father into the hands of the Eternal Father.

Mary, experiencing a sword piercing her heart as she waits, but waits in trust that the one who protected her will himself be protected on the journey into eternity.

Both gaze with infinite tenderness on St Joseph as he approaches his final journey.

As we keep our own vigil, we pray that Mary's hands work through hands of nurses and carers to soothe and calm N... We pray that someone holds N's hand as Jesus hold Joseph's, firm, gentle, reassuring that he is not alone.

IDEAS THAT MIGHT HELP YOU.

Create a prayer space – with a favourite photograph of your loved one and a few other things of special significance. Think about using an electronic candle so that you can leave it “lit” all the time.

If you are keeping a vigil-at-home with separated members of your family, suggest that they create a similar setting to unite you all... Share photographs.

Try to create a gentle routine – not to the minute, but ensure that you eat and sleep to keep yourself as well as you can.

Agree a prayer-time with your family and/ or close friends who keep this vigil with you. You may have family-members who are not pray-ers or who are too angry and afraid to pray. Be understanding but ensure that they know that you will be praying.

SCRIPTURE THAT YOU MIGHT FIND USEFUL.

It can be useful to choose one – or a couple of words or phrases and have them your mind and heart for the times when anxiety and fear threaten to disturb you.

‘Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.’

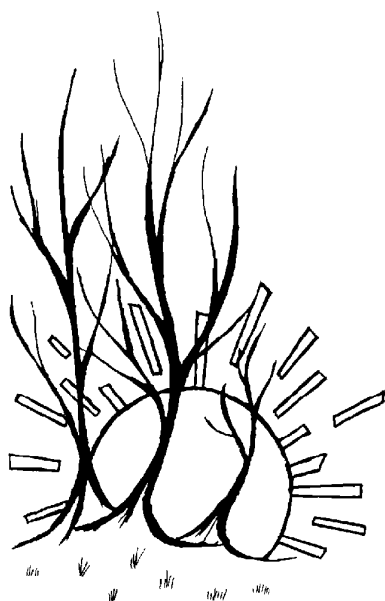

Amen.

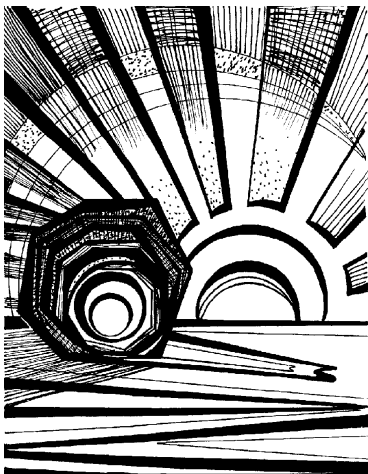
