Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel;
he has come to his people and set them free.
He has raised up for us a mighty saviour,
born of the house of his servant David.
Through his holy prophets he promised of old

SECOND READING OF THE DAY – PHILIPPIANS 2: 6-11
(we have added verses 1-5 as they seem so timely in light of the pandemic).

So if in Christ there is anything that will move you, any incentive in love, any fellowship in the Spirit, any warmth and sympathy – I appeal to you, make my joy complete by being of a single mind, one in love, one in heart and one in mind. Nothing is to be done out of jealousy or vanity; instead out of humility of mind, everyone should give preference to others, everyone pursuing not selfish interest but those of others, Make your own the mind of Christ Jesus:

His state was divine,
yet Christ Jesus did not cling
to his equality with God
but emptied himself
to assume the condition of a slave,

and became as men are,
 and being as all men are,
 he was humbler yet,
 even to accepting death,
 death on a cross.
 But God raised him high
 and gave him the name
 which is above all other names
 so that all beings
 in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld,
 should bend the knee at the name of Jesus
 and that every tongue should acclaim
 Jesus Christ as Lord,
 to the glory of God the Father.

Although this appears in a letter by St Paul, it is thought that he is using words of a very ancient Christian hymn. It recognises the fact that Jesus is the Son of God – but was humble enough to enter into the pain and sorrow of the world – even unto death. This is the mind and heart that Paul is calling the early Christians to. This is the mind and heart that God is calling us to.

- Which word or phrase seems to resonate most deeply with you? Jot them down if it helps – or repeat them to memorise them.
- How might you put on the mind and heart of Christ today – with your family – with your friends – those with whom you work – online communities – and...?
- Use your word or phrase as a mantra as you go through the morning.

THE GOSPEL OF THE DAY – MATTHEW 21: 1-11

Today we have two Gospels – the entry into Jerusalem and the Passion according to Matthew. We will use the first for our reflections today.

When they drew near to Jerusalem
and came to Bethphage, to the Mount of Olives,
Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them,
'Go into the village opposite you,
and immediately you will find an ass tied,
and a colt with her;
untie them and bring them to me.
If anyone says anything to you, you shall say,
"The Lord has need of them,"
and he will send them immediately'.
This took place to fulfil
what was spoken by the prophet, saying,
'Tell the daughter of Zion,
Behold, your king is coming to you,
humble and mounted on an ass,
and on a colt, the foal of an ass'.
The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them;
they brought the ass and the colt,
and put their garments on them, and he sat thereon.
Most of the crowd spread their garments on the road,
and others cut branches from the trees
and spread them on the road.
And the crowds that went before him
and that followed him shouted,
'Hosanna to the Son of David!
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!
Hosanna in the highest!'
And when he entered Jerusalem
all the city was stirred, saying, 'Who is this?'
And the crowds said,
'The prophet Jesus from Nazareth of Galilee'.



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- This is quite an easy Gospel to imagine yourself watching, or taking part in, the events. Spend some time doing just that – imagining the excitement – seeing the crowds – hearing the shouts – and watching Jesus ...
- What were the hopes the people were pinning on Jesus? What happens to people when their hopes are not fulfilled? And how does that reflect what is happening in our world today?

When have you made selfish choices? Ask God for forgiveness and ideas on how to put things right.

according to your promise.


For my eyes have seen your salvation,
